The man behind the title.... By John Fennell

It has been my pleasure to have been able to speak to our Provincial Grand Charity Steward David Dey about his role and more importantly about himself which gives a great insight to the person behind the title. In his own words he describes many years of his charity work:



"The office of Charity Steward is a busy one but so rewarding especially this year. When asked by the PGM to become Provincial Charity Steward I was very honoured but also apprehensive. However with the continuing support from the Brethren and the MCF I have been able to build on the good work of my predecessors.

I first became involved in charities over 50 years ago when a friend of ours lost her young son to Leukaemia. Sylvia and I joined the local committee for Cancer Research. In 1973 I became a member of Worcester Round Table who raised funds for many local charities. Worcester Talking Newspaper for the Blind was one of the charities we supported. They record the news from our local newspaper onto cassette (now computer pens) which is then distributed to over 300+ Visually Impaired people in Worcester. My mother being registered Blind was one of their first listeners. Sylvia and I became and still remain volunteers. Sylvia took on the role of Worcester Chairman and National Chairman and was honoured with an MBE for her services to Charity in 2007.

Throughout the years I have rattled collecting tins in the High Street, built playgrounds, decorated old people's homes, organised summer trips, arranged old folk parties, charity balls, built community bonfires, sold off land from our local Commandery and even been Father Christmas in a Christmas grotto made of polystyrene blocks..... health & safety would have a breakdown!

I became a Freemason in 1995 joining Page Lodge in Worcester and I have been proud of the charity work untaken by Freemasons locally and nationally.

This year the need to support our community has been more important than ever. An immediate response was given in April when we delivered 30 Galaxy tablets to Worcestershire Royal Hospital to allow patients to communicate with their loved ones. The PGM allowed the use of funds remaining from the Triple Century Appeal and we received an additional £38,000 from the MCF for distribution within the Province. To date we have made over 50 separate donations totalling in excess of £45,000. Our support includes organisations making masks and PPE, transport for the elderly and disabled, scouting, donations to local food banks and many more community projects. During this pandemic Worcestershire Freemasons have given almost £100,000 locally. However more help is needed and our support for the MCF and in particular Festival 2022 is now more important than ever. "

As our PGCStwd has mentioned we have been very successful in our charity work during Covid 19 but it is only through your hard work and deeds that allows this to happen and continue. Leslie and Ivy Pountney Trust

The trust was established in 1994 in memory of WBro LH Pountney, a much loved former Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies. The name of his widow Ivy, who had been a substantial benefactor of the Fund, was added on her death in 2001 at the request of her second husband WBro RN Child himself a substantial donor.

The trustees make grants to young people to help with the funding of educational projects particularly in the cases where parental means are limited. Vocation courses, sporting tours, purchase of musical instrument, a gap year activity such as teaching in the Third World are among the things that have attracted funding in the recent past. The trustees will consider any nominations put forward by Lodges in the Provinces of Worcestershire and Warwickshire preference being given to children of Freemasons. Poppy Appeal 111 Mile Road March

Luke Ford and WBro Karl Nicholson Godson Lodge No. 2385 are road marching 111 miles over 11 consecutive days with 11kg dead weight in aid of The Royal British Legion's Poppy Appeal 2020 - aiming to finish at Worcester Cathedral War Memorial by 11:00 on the 11th November 2020, trying to raise £1111.11p

They reasoned that the RBL Poppy Appeal might struggle this year, and after the success of a similar walk they did back during the lockdown in May (road marching 100 miles in 14 days with 10kg dead weight) raising £1137 for the RAF Benevolent Fund, they thought they would do it again but upping the stakes to make the challenge more difficult, and of course this time in the cold and no doubt wet!
