The joyfulness and solemnity of the Cathedral Service

A personal reflection by Ian Crowder

There is surely little doubt that those entering Worcester Cathedral are awed by its colossal scale, its sheer beauty and spiritual peace that seems to touch the soul. Then thoughts perhaps turn to the skill and ingenuity of the ancient stonemasons who, over nearly 500 years from 1084, designed and built its soaring Norman and Perpendicular Gothic columns, and its exquisite stone tracery that has so firmly stood the test of time.

But, to attend a service in this glorious Cathedral Church, dedicated to the Blessed Mary the Virgin, takes that experience to a higher level. Not only is it deeply moving – especially when the congregation is made up of Worcestershire Masons and their families and friends – but filled with joy too.

The Annual Worcestershire Provincial Cathedral Service took place after a two-year gap for reasons we all understand. As the Senior Warden of Permanent Way Lodge no. 9951, it was for me a huge honour to parade with my WM, WBro David Shrimpton, into the great Nave to the thundering of the organ played by WBro David J Lane, Provincial Grand Organist.

Of course, the Province has the closest of links with the Cathedral having donated hundreds of thousands of pounds over the years, particularly to the cost of training the active Masons who maintain this majestic building. Indeed, it was interesting to learn that Worcester is one of only nine Cathedrals in the UK to have its own dedicated stonemasonry workshops and team. I felt proud of the part we play to ensuring the physical wellbeing of this glorious structure for generations to come.

This service was a both uplifting and moving occasion. Uplifting, in that we were able to gather again in this act of worship after the long lockdowns of the pandemic. Moving, because of the candle lit by the PGM, and on the Altar were the names of so many Brethren we have lost and the opportunity to pay tribute to them, to their families and the medical staff who cared for them was a brief but truly solemn moment.

They are now in the Grand Lodge Above – and I fancied that they may have been watching our gathering and nodding their approval.

All too soon came the ‘goodbyes’ and invitations ‘to our next meeting’. I came away with the strong impression that Freemasonry – and our Province in particular – has emerged from one of the most challenging periods in its long history in good health and very good spirits.



Children in West Midlands schools will get role models thanks to Worcestershire Freemasons

More vulnerable children and young people across the West Midlands will be given access to a trained volunteer role model, following a grant of £5,000 from Worcestershire Freemasons to the Mentor Link charity.

Many vulnerable young people are easily taken in by negative outside influences, and mentoring gives them a positive adult role-model to offer reassurance, stability and guidance during difficult times in their lives, helping them to achieve positive changes both personally and educationally.

The children will be referred to Mentor Link when school-based mentoring is not appropriate or possible. Sessions will be delivered weekly and offer one-to-one social and emotional listening support to disadvantaged and vulnerable young people who are experiencing difficulties such as anxiety, self-harm and low-level mental issues; low self-esteem and confidence; bullying; traumatic bereavement; and family breakdown.

When the head of Worcestershire Freemasons, Robert Vaughan, visited Mentor Link, he met Marissa, who was herself supported by Mentor Link when she was in high school. At the time she was a young carer for her six siblings following her parents' separation. She was referred to the charity to help her cope with the demands of home and school life. She became a mentor herself in 2017, wanting to give something back.

She is now settled down and the proud mum of two children herself.

Part of the money from Worcestershire Freemasons will help train more people like Marissa to become mentors to vulnerable and disadvantaged young people in the West Midlands. The figures prove Mentor Link's success. Of the 453 mentees supported by Mentor Link in 2019 across the West Midlands. 89 per cent improved their confidence and self-esteem, 72 per cent their academic performance, 68 per cent their behaviours, 72 per cent improved their relationships with family, peers and teachers, 78 per cent their health and wellbeing, and 71 per cent improved engagement with their community.

The grant from Worcestershire Freemasons comes through the Masonic Charitable Foundation, which is funded by Freemasons, their families and friends, from across England and Wales.

Andrea Maddocks, CEO at Mentor Link, said:

“We’re very grateful to Worcestershire Freemasons for their generous grant. Mentoring can be an enormous help to vulnerable young people with their mental-health and wellbeing, and the distressing and destabilising time so many of them have had during the pandemic means our service is needed more than ever.”

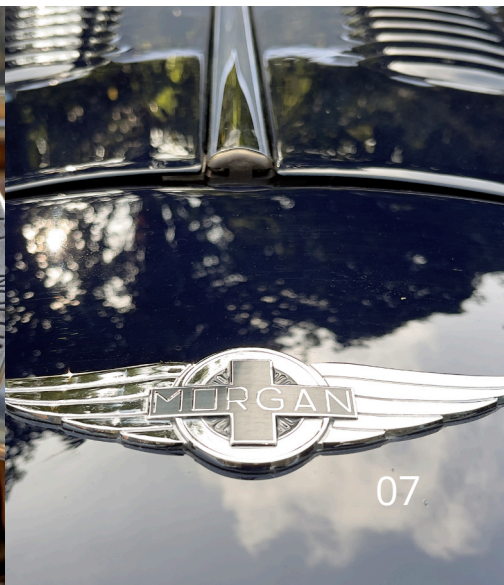
Robert Vaughan, Head of Freemasonry in Worcestershire, said:

“I’m very pleased we’ve been able to help Mentor Link with their excellent project to give vulnerable children an adult role model. It’s a tried and tested way to help them improve their behaviour and self-confidence, not to mention their performance in the classroom. Children only get one chance at getting an education and Mentor Link’s work can transform their life chances.”

Freemasons supporting over a million people with mental health issues

To help more than 1.4 million people experiencing mental health issues, Freemasons are donating more than £550,000 to help citizens across the UK.

Many people are reaching crisis point with their mental health due to the pandemic. According to NHS Prevalence Data 2020, one in six young people have a probable mental disorder, while the Young Minds Survey 2020 found 83% of young people said the pandemic had made their mental health worse.

To help the population exit the pandemic in a better state of mental health, the **United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE)**, the governing body for Freemasonry in England and Wales, are supporting various institutions, schools and universities.

Among the institutions receiving support, the Freemasons are donating £125,000 to Young Minds to help them to support approximately 1.4 million young people. The goal is to increase Young Minds' reach by 10% and help many more young people find the support they need, when they need it, and be able to take practical, actionable steps to improve their mental health.

The donation will enable the project to proactively recruit more young Black people and disabled people, to diversify Young Minds' pool of bloggers to expand the experiences and voices on the website. The idea is to create more content on racism and mental health, as well as for those living with bipolar disorder.

The UGLE and the Masonic Charitable Foundation's (MCF) - the Freemasons' charity - donations will also help 100,000 children and young people across the UK to access information, support and guidance online.

In addition, the donation will help to develop and pilot the Suicide Safer Schools programme in three to five schools in west Cumbria, supporting 1,000 young people and 500 parents, teachers and staff, by raising awareness of suicide prevention, understanding help-seeking behaviour, and training selected staff in suicide intervention.

In a separate project, the Freemasons also aim to reach 800 young people in London, who will benefit from better understanding about the prevention of young suicide through volunteers running awareness-raising events in their local communities.

Elsewhere, 2,188 children and young people through three projects will be supported with mentoring and skills workshops. About 270 parents/staff will receive awareness workshops and support, while 270 young people will be trained as peer mentors.

The Freemasons' donations will also support at least 600 teachers, professionals and parents, who will be provided with support through three projects offering mental health first aid training, learning events and parental support, and this will in turn will help 25,000 children and young people.

Chairman — Kings Heath Masonic Hall Board of Directors

Last month saw the exciting news that Worshipful Brother Ed Baker has been elected Chairman of the Kings Heath Masonic Hall Company with effect from 4th August, taking over from WBro Howard Wilson who has driven the refurbishment works over the last 18 months. The Hall was renamed at the same meeting and is now the Kings Heath Freemasons Hall (KHFH).

Ed is a well-known, highly respected and well-liked brother who has been a Worcestershire Mason for over twenty-five years. His mother lodge was Peace & Goodwill No. 6010 (formerly meeting at Kings Heath).

Ed has made clear his hopes for KHFH and its board members. To deliver an open transparent management approach, that consistently seeks actionable feedback. With the clear aim that it creates a sensible, consistent and considerate dialogue with all of the Masonic units Meeting at Kings Heath.



Another key tenet of the new approach will be to, where possible, reduce the financial burden on the existing lodges at Kings Heath. This will take the form of looking to gradually introduce workable external bookings and with the opening of the bar to encourage a more convivial atmosphere within the building and begin to repay the generous loans required to refurbish the Hall.

The great news is that the Hall is now fully reopened with new catering and management arrangements following the extensive building work that has taken place over the last eighteen months. The finances and published business plan are on track. More importantly, other projects are also being carefully looked at to ensure the future economic viability of the Hall.

Finally, Ed has advised that he is actively seeking additional new Directors with appropriate skills and experience to complement the Boards activities. Notification will be formally made in the coming weeks. All posts are of course voluntary, unpaid and governed by the KHFH board of directors code of practice.



Freemasons Ride to the Challenge

The charity work of Freemasons isn't just about monetary actions, it can also be about giving up some of your time up to help the local community.

A recent post on one of the Worcestershire bikers Facebook page saw a request from a mum of a schoolgirl, who wanted to go to her prom on a motorbike. Her mum stated that "Felicity had been bullied from her very first day of primary school, all the way through into her last weeks of high school. Felicity is 15 and has dyslexia and she is currently being diagnosed with Asperger's, so she finds making friends incredibly difficult". Felicity has a love of bikes and anything alternative - she loves to be in her boots and her leather jacket and for that she's been picked on". She continued "Felicity has been looking forward to her prom as she feels that this will be the point where she can show them (the bullies) that they can't hurt her anymore."

She was hoping that a "few" bikes could escort Felicity from Droitwich, to her prom at Worcester Rugby Club.

The Worcestershire Chapter of the Widows Sons (the Masonic Bikers Association, WSMBA) took up the challenge and agreed to take part and help marshal the event — and unbelievably, what actually took place was that over 250 bikes turned up! Just getting off the car park in Droitwich took over half an hour, explained WBro Andy Philpott, President of the Worcester WSMBA, and the route took them on a tour of Droitwich and surrounding area and onto The Rugby Club - to see the look on Felicity's face, and her family's, just showed how proud we were of all the bikers that took part, he said. Her father quoted "Proud of her doesn't even touch it, she's an amazing girl and she hasn't deserved any of this, so to see her light up like a Christmas tree was absolutely fantastic".

The news reports went viral on Facebook and Twitter, appearing in Worcester, Birmingham and other newspapers, and even made the Daily Mail. And to top it all, after reading these reports, the Widows Sons have now received an application from a non-Mason to join up, and hopefully be a candidate for the Lodge of Progress!





Stourbridge Dedication



STOURBRIDGE Freemasons have celebrated the opening of a new freemasonry centre in the town after quitting their long-time masonic hall at The Talbot Hotel where they had been meeting for centuries.

The Deputy Mayor of Dudley, Councillor Sue Greenaway, and her consort, husband Desmond, attended the official opening of the new base at the former Carlisle Hall in Victoria Street, just off the ring road, on Sunday August 29.





A cheque for £150 was handed over for the Mayor of Dudley's chosen charities for 2021-22 and Wollaston resident Constance Webb 'cut the ribbon' at the new centre - having bought the building for the Freemasons in memory of her late husband James Webb.

The Stourbridge Masonic Management Co had been looking for a new place to meet for some time - having called the historic Talbot Hotel in Stourbridge High Street home since 1733.

Lodges from Dudley will also join the Stourbridge Freemasons in relocating to the new centre, which will be known as the James S Webb Freemasonry Centre.

The dedication ceremony itself was held under the banner of the oldest Stourbridge Lodge — the Lodge of Stability No. 564 and attended by 82 brethren. The PGM RWBro Robert C Vaughan, accompanied by officers of Grand and Provincial rank, was the Dedicating Officer for the evening; which was followed by a Festive Board at Stourbridge Rugby Football Club.

The building was previously used by Dudley Mind and before that the WRVS - having originally been built as a Temperance Hall in 1922 in memory of the Countess of Carlisle, national president of the British Women's Temperance Association.

Brethren of Priory Lodge 5545: who now meet at Halesowen following the closure of Dudley Masonic Hall, rose to the challenge with fantastic results.

Lodge Secretary WBro Les Charters explained :

"We met in October with only six brethren in attendance. It felt very strange not to have a Festive Board and the usual raffle and I realised that as a consequence our charitable giving had reduced, in particular to F2022.

I therefore sent a message out to all Brethren requesting that they make a donation towards the Festival 2022, as by not having meetings we had all saved a significant amount of money. The aim was to raise £1,000 but happily the brethren dug deep, and with an additional donation from lodge funds, we achieved £1,200.

We have also increased awareness of regular giving which is vital to the success of F2022."
