### Fort Royal: former Army Lodge flying high

The latest in our series of stories about special interest Lodges pays a visit to Fort Royal. Ian Crowder chats to Bro's Roy Walford and Joe Parker.

"It's nice to see a change of uniform colour!" declared WBro Roy Walford, secretary of Fort Royal Lodge No. 4565.

He was referring to the influx of members – mainly initiates – over recent years, of those from the ATC or are serving (or have served) in the RAF.

That's because Fort Royal Lodge which was consecrated in November 1923 – 97 years ago this month – was initially a Military Lodge. At the time, the First World War had not long ended and there was a clear need for a new Lodge for military and ex-military men. Its first Master in fact, was also Provincial Grand Master, the RW Bro General Sir Francis Davies. The sponsoring Lodge was Worcester Lodge No. 280.

So how did the more recent RAF influence arise? "We had a couple of RAF Brethren and one, Squadron Leader Bill Hoe, recruited Flt Lt Nigel Lockwood, who in turn did a splendid job attracting initiates from the Kidderminster ATC," explains Roy - it became quite an intense time with a couple of initiations every year!

One of those initiates was Bro Joe Parker who was initiated four years ago and is now Senior Deacon. "I'm really missing Freemasonry, thanks to Covid-19, but it is good to be part of how Freemasonry has jumped into action during the crisis" he says.

Roy however points out, that nowadays a military background certainly isn't a requirement for membership although it's good to see about half our membership is made up of service Brethren". I don't have a military background and was initiated into Fort Royal 20 years ago – although my father was a serviceman in the RAF but wasn't a Mason. However my grandfather was both a Mason and an Army officer!"

During lockdown no meetings have taken place although the Lodge was represented on Remembrance Sunday at St. Peter's, Martley of which Roy is also Churchwarden. "It was a very moving and solemn occasion and, if anything, was all the more moving being outdoors with birdsong filling the silence.

Fort Royal meets four times per year at Rainbow Hill - "We welcome visitors," Roy says enthusiastically. "Like many Worcestershire Lodges, we have some workings that are unique and are often commented on. Whether they came about by design or because they were mistakes that were perpetuated, we'll never know!"

I was looking forward to undertaking the training for the role and being fully prepared for the duties expected of me. I wanted to make sure


that I would be able to play my part proficiently and would hopefully help to make the installation of a new Worshipful Master as memorable for him, and the Lodge, as possible.
