Famous Freemasons

Col. Edwin Eugene "Buzz" Aldrin



Aldrin was the first Freemason to set foot upon the Moon. Initiated at Oak Park Lodge No. 864, Montgomery, Alabama, on 17th February 1955.

Aldrin under special deputation of the Grand Master of Texas, J. Guy Smith, was given authority to open a Representation of the Grand Lodge of Texas on the Moon and establish Masonic Territorial Jurisdiction there for the Grand Lodge of Texas.

The deputation was carried to the moon by Aldrin on Apollo II on July 20, 1969.

Raising the White Ensign

Ian Crowder chats with Ian Fothergill, the lively 'commander' of White Ensign Lodge



That the lodge is firmly in 'dry dock' thanks to Covid, the skipper (or Master) of White Ensign Lodge No. 9169, Ian Fothergill, is certainly not downbeat about the enforced shore leave. In fact, he speaks with considerable enthusiasm about the Lodge and the prospects of 'putting to sea' again, as the icebound waters of lockdown begin to thaw.

"We may not be afloat at present, but it's certainly not stopping us from making the most of what we have. In fact, we hold a weekly Zoom meeting which helps us to keep in touch with one another during the lockdown and show that we are there, should anyone need help."

White Ensign Lodge, as the name and the references to seafaring suggest, was consecrated as a Naval Lodge, in December 1985. Explains Ian, who served for 17 years with the Special Forces in the Royal Marines: "It all started when Charles Shave, a Royal Navy Artificer, used to travel from the Midlands with a couple of 'shipmates' to the Installation at his mother White Ensign Lodge in Gillingham, Kent. He formed the idea of creating a White Ensign lodge closer to home, and Worcestershire was happy for it to drop anchor in the Province.

"In the event there were 17 founders. The requirement from the start, was that Brethren should have served in any rank, in the Royal Navy or the Royal Marines. The voyage got off to a great start, with new Brethren recruited from the Nautical Services Club. But more recently, we have broadened the scope to include any Brother who has served under the Crown and that includes civil servants. We also welcome initiates who have a connection – for example, the son of a former serviceman or who has served under the Crown."

All members wear a White Ensign pin badge – but 'special reservists', (permanently invited guests), receive a certificate and wear a red ensign pin. "But everyone is welcome, whatever badge they wear: we are Brethren after all, look out for each other, and collectively do a huge amount for charity, particularly service charities and Festival 2022," says Ian.

The Lodge originally met, oddly, on the first working day of the fifth week at Kings Heath, which began to prove difficult to schedule. In 2012, the Lodge set sail for Redditch, where it now meets on the last Friday of January, March, May and October and the first Friday in December for the Installation.

Not every brother may have served in the RN or RM, but the Lodge follows many Naval traditions. "We raise and lower the Ensign to a bugle call at the opening and closing of the Lodge, for example. And when we move to the Mess Deck (to landlubbers, the Festive Board), we start with a tot of rum - so you may be sure we are going to enjoy ourselves in the best Naval tradition," lan adds, with a twinkle in his eye. "Of course, order is kept using a ships bell, while a Master at Arms issues 50p fines for errors in the Lodge Room and misbehaviour at the Festive Board!


"Our social events are a lot of fun too, not least Trafalgar Night, when the Mess Deck is dressed with bunting and it's fair to say, we really push the boat out. Similarly, we enjoy burn's Night, and in April, a triple event of revelry when we will celebrate St. George's Night, Shakespeare's birthday and the start of the asparagus season. It's clear that White Ensign Lodge is extremely lively and has a healthy membership of 40.

Superhero Surprise - Lockdown recognition



No one was more surprised than Bro Martin Carver, the Junior Warden of White Ensign Lodge No. 9169, when he opened his post on Wednesday 3rd March. He found he had been awarded a "Certificate of Commendation" personally signed by The MW The Grand Master for "...outstanding contribution to Freemasonry's role in our nation's fight against Covid-19"

Martin had been proposed by our PGM, for his splendid efforts of running Half- Marathons on behalf of the NHS, during last year's early lockdowns and featured in Square News at the time.
